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
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



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Wild Orchid Routes!

Wild Orchids - the most beautiful exotic countryside flowers.

45% of wild orchids species are registered in Spain, with 60% of those registered in Andalusia, Málaga.

Orchids are beautiful, elegant plants, which have very complex flowers and complicated ecological interactions with pollination agents and fungus they have types of symbiotic association with.

We have 45 species of orchids in Málaga, real gems, which are spread all over our territory and can be seen thanks to the publication 'Get to know the orchids along the Great Málaga path and the province', where you will find the clues which will help you spot and admire them.

The Málaga province is full of life and many natural beauties which are completely unknown. For instance, did you know that this province has more than 300 species of birds, 110 species of diurnal butterflies and 54 dragonflies? Wild orchids are natural wonders that live in forests, dunes, countryside and Málaga's mountains.

These plants are some of the most beautiful flowers we can find thanks to their colours and appearance, but they often go unnoticed due to their small size. Moreover, in order to ensure pollination, they take on the form of insects. In the Sierra de las Nieves, there are species which are rare or more difficult to find, such as Ophrys atlantica, Orchis cazorlensis, Cephalantera rubra,







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Serapias parviflora or Anacamptis pyramidalis, and even some more common ones like Himantoglossum robertianum and Ophrys lutea, scolopax, speculum and tenthredinifera. Aceras anthropophorum, Himantoglossum hircinum and Orchis olbiensis are common in Spanish fir forests. Cephalantera longifolia grow in chestnut groves, and Epipactis tremolsii, Limodorum trabutianum, Orchis champagneuxii e italica, Androrchis langei, Neotinea maculata andconica, and Dactylorhiza insularis and elata in dense oak forests. The latter one can be found in wet areas or close to springs.

The Orchid Routes in Jimera de Líbar

Jimera de Líbar is a small but very beautiful town with 388 inhabitants according to the last census. It is placed in the Guadiaro Valley in the Serranía de Ronda. The town took advantage of its railway stop from Ronda to Algeciras in order to promote the Fray Leopoldo's [Brother Leopoldo] Route to Alpandeire and has recently showed its exceptional heritage. The town has now created seven routes or paths with twenty species of wild orchids that have been registered there.

The orchids paths in Jimera de Libar are not longer than two kilometres and are accessible, certified, easy and so beautiful that you will not be able to resist taking photos of the orchids.

These seven routes, where the flowers are identified on the boards, are called: Path of Natural Wonders, the Pathway, Olive Track, the Boat's Slope, Meadow, Atajate Way and Orchards Path.

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

Ticks

Spring is in the air now I'm really looking forward to the warmer weather. But with spring also comes the worry of ticks. And this year with the weird warm to cold to warm again weather the ticks are in full force.

Tick facts

Ticks are pretty small and sometimes barely visible to the human eye. They are similar to spiders in that they are arachnids and have eight legs. They vary in size and as adults range from between 2mm and 10mm in length.

The body of the tick is usually a teardrop shape but can balloon up considerably after feeding. Depending on the species of tick, they will also differ in colour with the majority being a brown or reddish-brown colour.

Like other arachnids, they go through four stages of the life cycle which are egg, larva, nymph, and adult.

As they are arachnids and not insects, they do not fly as they have no wings.

Ticks are also referred to as Ectoparasites (External Parasites) as they survive by feeding off the blood of mammals, birds, and sometimes reptiles and amphibians.

Where are Ticks Found?

Ticks or 'Garrapatas' in Spanish, are endemic to rural areas of Spain and other parts of the world, especially to wooded areas with tall grass and bushes where they lie in wait for any passing traffic such as us humans and other animals such as dogs and cats.

Ticks will generally perch themselves on the end of tall grasses and shrubs and once a new host comes along, they will cling on and embed themselves in the skin of the host. As they are parasitic by nature, they will do this to survive and feed off the new host's blood.

As a rule, ticks will need a host to live off, so areas in which there is an abundance of wildlife such as deer, rodents and livestock are perfect for ticks and an obvious habitat in which to find them.

But it's not only rural areas where they can be found. Ticks may also be found in urban areas as they can cling to clothes or get embedded in animal fur and be transported to a new location.

What are the Dangers of Ticks with Dogs?

Ticks are a real danger to dogs with one of the biggest issues being Canine Ehrlichiosis which can be transmitted to your dog by the tick.

There are three phases to infection which are Acute (Early disease), Subclinical (No outward signs of infection), and Chronic (Long-term infection).

The most common signs of Ehrlichiosis in dogs are:-

- Fever
- Lethargy
- Poor appetite
- Eye inflammation
- Neurological abnormalities
- Enlargement of the lymph nodes
- · Bruising or bleeding
- · Respiratory problems
- Seizures
- Weight loss

Outward signs of Ehrlichiosis may not be apparent for two weeks or more after the initial infection.

Ticks may also pass on other diseases to

animals such as Babesiosis and Anaplasmosis.

What do I do if I Find a Tick on my Dog?

If you do find any ticks you will need to remove them quickly by either using tweezers or a specialist tool that you can purchase from a pet store or your vet, or you can buy them online. Twist the tick off in a clockwise direction making sure not to leave the head embedded. Make sure you do not try to squeeze the tick's body as this may just cause the body to break off leaving the head still attached.

Dispose of the ticks by placing them in medical alcohol for 24 hours or wrapping them up and flushing them down the toilet. It's normal for there to be a red area or scab where the tick was. Keep an eye on it and continue to clean the area until it heals. If you regularly walk your dog in areas where ticks may be present, it may be worth purchasing a tick removal tool and some tick spray and shampoo so that you can remove ticks quickly and safely. You can also purchase a collar such as Seresto or Scalibor which can protect dogs from fleas and ticks for up to 8-12 months, and drop treatments such as Frontline, Advantix and many other natural, chemical-free solutions, chews and tablets.



On Monday 18th of March Lux Mundi, Torre del Mar held an event at the Centre to thank everyone involved to celebrate one year of the Food Drive which over the last 12 months has helped approximately: 1,100 individuals, with 285 bags of food, and filled with 4,500 items. We have more than doubled the number of families since March 2023, from 15-30. Our volunteers and donors have done an amazing job with contributing enough to ensure that 30 local families have the food and essentials they need, totalling over 1,000 Euros per month.

There were approximately 25 people including the food drive volunteers, staff from Lux Mundi, volunteers of Lux Mundi, Caritas staff, Hermandad de El Rocio staff, and businesses partners who have given time and money to the food drive.

Marisol Fernandez and other Caritas staff members were on hand. Marisol discussed how families come to them, and how they are vetted by Caritas. She also detailed what Caritas tries s to help these families become established, including rental assistance and utility assistance. Carmina Martin Alba and two other staff from the Hermandad de El Rocio also joined the group to discuss their efforts in feeding people in need. They are also dedicated to ensuring future generations also continue the work of charity.

Both organizations have joined with Lux Mundi in an ongoing partnership to do what is necessary to feed the families of Torre del Mar, whether Spaniards, people from South America, or migrants. The main message from the event: No one should ever go hungry.

Our partners include: Caritas, Hermandad de El Rocio, Go! Café, Oasis Hair and Beauty and BluCee Real Estate. Here is what Julia Bailey the project leader said in her speech at the event:- 'Good morning and thank you for coming to help us celebrate one year of the Torre Del Mar Food Drive. I'm Julia and together with Connie and now Diana, I lead this project. But it's the help of the people here, our volunteers and supporters that has made all this possible. A year ago, the food drive agreed to try to help sixteen local families in need, many of them with children and a year later we are helping thirty. This is all thanks to you. 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SEA FOOD PAELLA



Paella is one of the few dishes that can truly represent an entire country and has existed since approximately the 15th and 16th century. It is one of the most popular Spanish dishes all over the world. Spanish paella is a dish that is eaten throughout the year, and you can find it in any restaurant in Spain. Different provinces and



regions have their own version, this recipe is based on the Andalusian version.

Paella comes originally from Valencian region. Each region of Spain has its own recipe with different ingredients, but the Andalusian paella recipe has seafood as its main ingredient.

Even though the traditional paella from Andalusia is a dish made with seafood and rice, there are still hundreds of changes that you can make to the ingredients.

Seafood paella

Serves:- 4

Ingredients:-

2 cups (370g) short-grain rice

4 cups (950ml) of shrimp broth

½ kg of squid

½ kg of fresh prawns

1 handful of seashells clams and mussels

1 onion

1 medium tomato

½ red pepper

2 cloves of garlic

½ cup peas

1 bunch of fresh parsley leaves

Olive oil

Salt (to taste)

Pepper (to taste)

1 teaspoon yellow saffron powder





Preparation:-

To start making the traditional Spanish paella recipe you have to clean and peel the prawns. Use the shells and head to make broth and then set aside. You can skip this step and use store-bought fish broth. Also, clean the squid and chop them into a round shape.

After that clean the seashells with plenty of water to remove any sand residue.

In the paella pan or a very large, deep frying pan, sauté the onion, garlic, pepper, and tomato minced in small squares in olive oil. Add a little pepper and salt. Next put the squid and then the seashells. Let them cook for a few minutes. You will see that a broth starts to form, this is fine.

Add the 2 cups of rice and stir to mix everything. Then add 4 cups of the shrimp broth that you made earlier. If you don't have enough, complete with water.

Stir well. Add a teaspoon of yellow saffron powder to have the classic paella seasoning, and boil for about 3 minutes

Then add the fresh peas, and the parsley, (previously chopped). Check the salt and pepper and add more if necessary.

Traditional recipes say, to turn up the heat for 5 more minutes at that point, then turn off the heat and cover for 10 minutes to let it steam. At this time you can add some prawns with their shells.

The total cook time for the rice is approximately 20 minutes at medium heat, never stirred and only shaken a few times throughout the process.



Sangria

Serves:- 6 - 8

Ingredients:-

1 (750-ml.) bottle red wine

3/4 c. fresh orange juice

1/2 c. brandy

1/4 c. granulated sugar

1 orange, sliced

1 apple, sliced

1 c. fresh blueberries

1 (3") cinnamon stick

Preparation:-

In a large pitcher, mix wine, orange juice, brandy, and granulated sugar. Stir in oranges, apples, blueberries, strawberries, and cinnamon.


Refrigerate until ready to serve, at least 2 hours or preferably overnight.





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IMPORTANCE OF STRETCHING

People who practice sports tend to be more aware of the importance of stretching, but it is common to find people who stretch inappropriately. For this reason I am going to explain the reasons why we should do it, what the correct way is and when we should

CONSEQUENCES OF GOOD STRETCHING WORK IN SPORTS

Any sport is based on the functioning of the skeletal muscle system and more specifically the muscular or myofascial system, so if its length and mechanical functioning are not optimal, this will have a negative impact on sports performance and marks obtained. And the fact is that the muscles are authentic motorized pistons that largely base their ability to generate force on the path they are capable of taking from their maximum length to that of greatest shortening or contraction, that is, when the muscle stretches it charges an energy that discharge with muscle contraction and subsequent movement.

This is why complete, intense, long-lasting and frequent muscle stretching work will often lead to a moment of sporting performance and improved marks achieved. On the other hand, muscular imbalances between the left side and the right side or between the back and the front will generate not only a decrease in sports performance but greater mechanical suffering of all types of muscular, articular, interosseous, which will predispose you to suffering from all types of injuries, tendonitis, muscle tears, etc.

WHY SHOULD WE STRETCH IN SPORTS?

• Reduces muscle tension.

- · Increases amplitude and coordination of movements.
- · Prevents future injuries.
- Prepares the muscles for physical activity - in this case ballistic stretches are more indicated since they will not misinform the mechanoreceptors and will leave the muscle prepared to respond to a very large or sudden stretch.
- Improves knowledge of one's own body.
- · Improves circulation.
- · Helps reabsorb lactic acid, preventing muscle fatigue.
- · We achieve physical and therefore psychological well-being.

HOW TO STRETCH?

When we stretch a muscle, what we are doing is distancing the two insertion points of it, that is, the purpose is to separate the ends of the muscle so that its fibers stretch. To do this, one of these points must remain fixed and we will vary the amplitude on the moving point. We must respect a series of principles when stretching:

- We must respect the planes and axes in addition to the joint width.
- · We have to place the muscle in a state of pre-stretch and make the tensioning slow and progressive.
- It should not hurt, we should notice some tension but it should be tolerable.
- · During the stretch we must breathe deeply and regularly.
- · Respect stretching times.
- Progressive tensioning up to maximum tension.
- · Maintain maximum tension for approximately 20 seconds.
- · Return to the initial position slowly and progressively.



• Rest time: the sum of the time spent in the

3 previous steps.

WHEN TO STRETCH?

As a reference we can point out that it is not essential to stretch before or after regular training, but it is simply important to stretch at some point. This can be when we wake up, before going to bed, or during breaks at work. We must keep in mind that stretching or flexibility exercises should be part of our daily life.

ATHLETES

You should always stretch before and after exercise. It is more advisable to do ballistic stretches before practicing sports and leave static stretches for afterwards. But it is true that there is great controversy regarding this issue.

During the warm-up it is recommended to work on the mobility of the joints most involved and stretch the muscles most involved in the sport we practice.

After the activity, it is recommended to stretch to reduce tone, promote circulation and eliminate lactic acid.

During physical activity, when we perform an activity in series of series where breaks are taken, they are indicated to avoid loss of elasticity and facilitate muscle recovery.

NON-ATHLETES

Even if you do not do any sporting activity, it is advisable to dedicate a few minutes a day to stretching as a preventative measure. The ideal would be to stretch at the workplace, just before starting the workday, especially in jobs that involve repetitive movements or postures held for long periods of time. In this way we are warming up the muscles and preparing them for the day and thus we will be avoiding a possible contracture or injury.

Workers should emphasize the areas that are under tension during their work hours. So people who work sitting should place greater emphasis on the upper back, neck and shoulders, or people who work standing should emphasize the lumbar, hamstrings and calves. In conclusion, comment that it will be important to perform the stretches, both symmetrically and globally to have global elasticity of the entire musculoskeletal system, and to perform certain stretches asymmetrically to obtain compensation, for example when the left hamstrings are shorter than the rights hamstrings, or a right psoas that is shorter than the left.

GENERAL CONCLUSIONS

Correct stretching in sports is of vital importance, since it allows better muscle function, reducing muscle tension, preparing the muscles for physical activity (stretching before exercise) and helping the reabsorption of lactic acid (stretching after exercise). exercise) thus avoiding muscle fatique; Therefore, good stretching translates into an increase in sports performance. In addition, stretching prevents muscle imbalances that could cause injuries such as: tears, tendonitis, among others. Likewise, stretching is not reserved only for athletes; nonathletes can stretch as a preventative measure. Those people who work for hours with postures held for long periods of time generate great body tension, which is why a stretching routine before and after work is very beneficial.

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


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OBESITY!



In the ongoing struggle against obesity, individuals often find themselves grappling with an internal war—a complex battle waged within the recesses of their minds.. Every day, people fight a complex battle within their minds, wrestling with an unrelenting hunger after a hearty meal, succumbing to cravings for fried chicken or gummy bears.

These personal narratives echo the challenges faced by a substantial portion of adults grappling with obesity—a condition we, in the medical field, have come to recognize as a disease.

Over the years, debates have raged about the root causes, spanning genetic predispositions, lifestyle choices, and the omnipresence of carbohydrates and ultra-processed foods.

Traditional solutions, anchored in self-discipline and a simplistic "eat less, move more" mantra, often yield disheartening results.

Yet, a beacon of hope emerges in the form of brain-



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based therapies—a frontier I, as a physician, find both promising and controversial. From drugs meticulously designed to target reward and appetite centres to deep brain stimulation, a ground breaking intervention aiming to reset neural circuits, these treatments embody a paradigm shift. While debates persist, encompassing concerns about cost, side effects, and the potential to divert focus from lifestyle changes, there's a resounding agreement among my peers-a critical organ has been overlooked in our battle against obesity, and that organ is the brain.

As a doctor, I increasingly recognize that obesity likely involves a disruption within the very machinery of the brain. Our brains, akin to ceaselessly humming machines, interpret signals from the gut, hormones, and the environment to regulate hunger, assess the impact of food, and maintain energy balance. Research unveils malfunctioning circuits and pathways in individuals with obesity impaired dopamine receptors, disrupted gutbrain signalling, and muted responses to meals.

The question persists:
What triggers these
malfunctions within the
intricate network of the
brain? Genetics play a
role, undoubtedly,
accounting for a
significant portion of the
variability in body mass
index. However, it falls
short of explaining the
surge in obesity witnessed



over recent decades. Enter the changing landscape of our food supply, now dominated by ultra-processed foods constituting 60% of our diet—a significant contributing factor. These foods, laden with additives and artificial components, may disrupt the delicate balance of gut-brain signalling, leading to overconsumption.

In my experience, patients are turning to brain-based therapies with encouraging outcomes. Medications influencing hormones related to cravings and surgical interventions to modulate brain circuits are becoming integral components of the evolving

obesity treatment landscape. Success

stories resonate within my clinic, underscoring the potential of these approaches to effect meaningful change.

As the medical community continues to navigate neurological frontiers, it becomes evident that a nuanced understanding is imperative.

Addressing obesity requires acknowledging the intricate role of the brain in appetite regulation and weight management.

Patients traversing these innovative therapies embody a shift towards a holistic approach—a recognition of the multifaceted nature of obesity and a commitment to lasting, albeit delicate, remission.



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1. Swimming Can Help You Live Longer

Studies show that regular exercise, swimming included, may increase your longevity. According to a 2017 report commissioned by Swim England, swimmers had a 28 percent lower risk of early death and a 41 percent lower risk of death due to heart disease and stroke compared with those who don't

2. Swimming Can Help Keep You Lean

Swimming is a full-body workout. Swimming engages everything from the arms, shoulders, and legs to the core, glues, and back.

3. Swimming Boosts Heart Health

Like other forms of aerobic exercise, swimming can improve your cardiovascular fitness. Research shows swimming has been linked to improvements in hypertension, blood pressure, and other markers of cardiovascular health.

4. Those Laps Can Strengthen Your Lungs

If you've been diagnosed with a lung condition like asthma or chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, you might like hearing that the lungs are one of the biggest benefactors from swimming,

5. Swimming May Boost Brain Power

Exercise in general has been associated with improving cognition, but when researchers studied the specific benefits of swimming on cognition, they found a unique benefit. In one small study from the journal Physiological Reports, participants who did a 20-minute, moderate-intensity swim



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processed visual information and responded faster on cognitive tests conducted right before and immediately after their swim..

6. The Water Workout May Put You in a Better Mood

All exercise can be a mood booster. But a study published in 2003 in the Journal of Psychology found that a single session of swimming improved mood even more than a single session of aerobic dance (similar improvements in mood were linked with yoga and Feldenkrais movement, a body awareness practice, in the population of women studied).

7. Swimming May Help You Sleep

Improved sleep is a perk of sticking to just about any exercise routine. And that includes swimming.

8. For People With Chronic Pain, Swimming May Help

Conditions like arthritis and fibromyalgia often come with reduced mobility and in many cases, short- or long-term pain. This is where swimming can help. "A range of aquatic activities (including swimming) have been shown to help people with musculoskeletal conditions improve physical function and quality of life," Power says.

9. Swimming Is Good for Bone Health

A review published in 2020 in BioMed Research International found that three to six hours of swimming per week improved bone mineral density in postmenopausal women, especially among long-term swimmers. Though it's worth noting that there was no benefit to bone health in those who small less than three hours per week.

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Botanical Gardens of Málaga



La Concepción Botanical Garden hosts an enormous collection of more than 25,000 plants and it consists of many different sections showing the natural diversity of flora all around the

Its' heart is the 3.5 hectares the Historical Garden with more than 3000 species, waterfalls, streams, fountains, greenhouses and historical buildings. It's the oldest part of La Concepción, created 150 years ago by Loring family and soon declared a "garden of historical and artistic interest".

La Concepción estate stayed in private hands until 1990, it was then purchased by Malaga City Council. New, modern thematic gardens have been added to the Historical Part to create a space for research, preservation and education. Now the Botanical Gardens of Malaga occupy 55 hectares and apart from being a popular touristic attraction it creates space for species preservation, research and education.

The Historical Garden is surrounded by the botanical garden with plants arranged in distinct sections: the aquatic plants, prehistoric plants, orchids, greenhouses.

Additionally, in the northern section of the Botanical Garden Malaga, you can find a route known as "Around the World in 80 Trees" and a collection of palm trees as well as a section with regional plants.

The southern, warmest part of the garden is a selection of subtropical fruit trees as well as cacti and succulents. Finally, in the upper section of the Garden you can find two routes -"Forest" and "Viewpoint" featuring indigenous Mediterranean plants.

The arbour – the gem of the Botanical Garden Malaga is an iron pergola covered in Wisteria. It blooms in late March and early April, creating one of the most emblematic views of La Concepción.



The Loring museum – before a house to a magnificent collection of archaeological remains like Lex Flavia Malacitana, set of bronze tablets with Roman law statutes governing Malaga in AD 81-84. Now it displays a reconstruction of a Roman mosaic from the village of Cartama.



The Nymph's pond – a small pond with a sculpture by Valentin Dueñas is located next to the waterfalls and palm trees section.



The stately home – a classical style villa located in the central part of the Historical Garden; built by its original founders has hosted numerous social gatherings.



The historical viewpoint – the most characteristic spot of Botanical Garden Malaga is visible from the motorway. The historical viewpoint was built in 1920 by the second owner of the garden, Rafael Echevarria.





What to do in the Botanical Garden Malaga?

- a) Discover fauna and flora! Admiring plants is the obvious part of the visit but let's not forget that Botanical Garden is also a home for many different animals including rabbits, multiple species of birds, frogs and chameleons so keep your eyes sharp and cameras ready!

- c) Have a picnic! Since The Botanical Garden provides multiple resting areas we highly recommend to take your lunch with you and enjoy it in the exotic ambience of the garden. These picnic areas can be found in several spots of the gardens.
- **d)** Make it special! The Garden offers guided visits, nocturnal visits, events and workshops for children check their website to plan ahead.
- e) Take a photo! A visit to the Botanical Garden is a really good chance to take stunning holiday photos in an exotic setting. Choose between the desert-like section with succulents and cactuses or a jungle with palm trees and monstera plants.
- f) Go on a hike! If you are dreaming about hiking in Spain and admiring the stunning landscapes but the length of your visit won't allow you. In the Botanical Gardens of Malaga, we highly recommend two minihiking routes in the Garden Viewpoint and Forest. They will allow you to get a taste of the wilder part of Spain with beautiful views and ingenious fauna and flora.
- **g)** Enjoy a romantic date! The ambience of the garden and its lush flora create a perfect atmosphere for a romantic stroll along winding paths and charming waterfalls.
- h) Learn! Take a thematic route and learn more about plants in different parts of the world. Among many others you can try "Around the World in 80 Trees" or "Mapa-Mundi" of palm trees.

History of the Botanical Garden Malaga

The 150 years history of the Jardín Botánico-Histórico La Concepción starts with Marquis and Marchioness of the House of Loring, Jorge Enrique Loring y Oyarzábal and Amalia Heredia Livermore, an influential couple well known among the bourgeois of Malaga.

In 1855 they joined together several smaller estates north of the city which were previously used for cultivating olives, almonds, vines and citrus trees. The garden quickly gained recognition under the supervision of a French gardener Jacinto Chamoussent. It was famous not only for the great collection of plants but also thanks to multiple archaeological remains gathered by Loring Museum located in La Conception.

In 1911 La Conceptión Estate was purchased by Rafael Echevarria and Amalia Echevarrieta, a couple from Bilbao who expanded the Garden and added many of its most characteristic elements such as the Nymph Stream, the Palm Tree Avenue and the Viewpoint.

The third owner was Amalia's brother Horacio Eschevarrieta. He took over the Estate in 1943 and kept it in perfect condition until his death in 1963. Subsequent years saw a gradual decline of the Garden.

Finally, in 1990, Malaga City Council purchased the Estate and after 4 years opened it to the public. As early as 1943 the garden had been declared a Place of Historical and Artistic Interest and now it is known as a Place of Cultural Interest.

Opening times:- April 1st to September 30th (9:30 - 20:30) / October 1st to March 31st (9:30 - 17:30) Closing days:- December 25th , January 1st and every Monday.

Visitors may remain in the garden for up to half an hour after closing time.

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
