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

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

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Things to do in Málaga this summer!

There are so many awesome things to do in Málaga. Whether you love history, culture, food, or great beaches there are many places to visit in Málaga to suit your style.

1. The Alcazaba

Andalucia is full of history from the times of the Moors and the Alcazaba is one of the best examples of their architecture that was left behind. Built originally in the 11th century, Alcazaba comes from the Arabic word for citadel. Built on a hill and using some of the surrounding Roman ruins (look for the marble pillars as you walk up to the top!), this is one of the most extraordinary tourist attractions in Málaga.

Take your phone with you so that you can scan the QR code at the entrance and listen to the audio guide as you explore. The audio guide corresponds to numbers that have been left all over the citadel and you can listen to stories and learn about each part and what role it played in history. Tickets to the Alcazaba are €3.50 per person, however, if you plan to also visit the Gibralfaro castle nearby, you would be better off purchasing the €5.50 combo ticket. The ticket is valid for 48 hours, so you don't have to visit both on the same day. If you visit on Sunday after 2 pm, entrance is free. This means of course, that it will also be very busy at this time.



2. The Roman Theater

Just below the Alcazaba and an easy Málaga attraction to visit while you are nearby is the Roman Theater. You can see the entire theater from the plaza that sits in front of it and you don't need to enter unless you want to walk amongst the amphitheater stairs and take a seat. Entry is free, so if you have time it is well worth walking through. The theater was built in the first century AD and it remained a theater until the third century. When Málaga became part of Al-Andalus and was ruled by the Moors, the theater became a stone quarry.

Málaga's Roman theater wasn't actually discovered until 1951 and it wasn't completely uncovered until 1995! It's also said that Antonio Banderas, who grew up in Málaga, performed in shows at this theater when he was a child. The even more fascinating thing about this is that the shows would have been banned under Franco's rule at the time, so he was performing in secret!



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3. Climb to the top of the Cathedral

The Catedral de la Encarnación de Málaga or the Cathedral of the Incarnation of Málaga is located in the Centro neighbourhood in the centre of the city. Climbing to the top of the cathedral is one of the top activities in Málaga and well worth it not only for the views, but to learn more about the history of the city. Just like with the Alcazaba, the cathedral has a free audio guide that you can listen to as you explore the different parts of the church. Through the narrow streets of the centre of Málaga, you will find the entrance to the cathedral which was built between 1528 and 1782 on the site of a former Moorish Mosque.

It is a combination of Baroque and Renaissance styles with the facade being almost completely Baroque and the interior following the original plans to remain in the Renaissance style. General admission to visit only the inside of the cathedral costs €8 per person. General admission just to climb to the roof of the cathedral also costs €8. If you want to do both, then you can purchase a combined ticket which costs €12..



4. The Gibralfaro views

Another of the top Málaga attractions not to miss is the Gibralfar This is the first stop on your tour of Málaga. Just like with the Alcazaba, the individual ticket costs €3.50, but if you purchase the combo with the Alcazaba, it costs €5.50. (If you are visiting Málaga without a car, you will have quite a walk to the top).

From the base you have a lot of stairs to contend with, so I highly recommend visiting as early as possible before it gets too hot. You will also want to wear sturdy walking shoes. The path up to the top is quite steep in some places and is made of stone that can sometimes get slippery. There are water fountains at the top (and at the bottom), so be sure to pack your reusable water bottle. The Gibralfaro is what remains of a 10th-century Moorish castle fortress that sits at the highest point in the downtown area. You can actually just walk to the top near the entrance to enjoy the views if you aren't interested in the history of the castle. There is also a wonderful audio guide available if you bring your phone with you to the castle.



5. Picasso Museum

The Picasso Museum might just be the most popular tourist attraction in Málaga. On October 25, 1881, Pablo Ruiz was born in the city of Málaga. He would later take his mother's last name, Picasso. Málaga is very proud to

be the birthplace of one of the world's most influential artists and you can visit the museum for €9 per person every day of the week.

The museum has a large collection of Picasso's work and it is displayed in a way that is both chronological and thematic so that you really see the changes in Picasso's work across his lifetime. Málaga loves an audio guide, because you get one here too. You can choose which language you'd like to listen to and you can explore the museum at your own pace while learning about the life of a controversial but no doubt talented man.

6. Málaga Museum

The Museo de Málaga or Málaga Museum is housed in the Palacio de Aduana, or the Customs Palace. The Palacio de Aduana was the original customs house for the Málaga port and was built in 1791 (although it wasn't completed until 1829). Opened in 2016 as a museum, the Málaga Museum is both an archeological and fine arts museum. The museum is of particular interest to history lovers as it retraces the story of the city, which is packed with a history dating back to Roman times.

With over 17,000 artifacts and pieces, this is the largest museum in Andalucia and the fifth largest in all of Spain. The best part is that it is only €1.50 and if you are an EU citizen it's completely free.



7. Palmeral de Las Sorpresas

A very fancy name for the city's main portside promenade. The Palmeral de Las Sorpresas means the palm grove of surprises. Above all else, it's a wonderful place to head for a walk around sunset. There are indeed plenty of palm trees that line the boardwalk (nearly 400 of them in fact!). There are bars and small restaurants that lead all the way out to a lighthouse with the port opposite. It's a popular spot for families thanks to a nice playground and it's also a fantastic place to go for a run.

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8. Museo Carmen Thyssen Málaga

The Carmen Thyssen Museum is a great option if you enjoy art and have visited the other wonderful art museums around Málaga. The museum is made up mostly of the private collection of the museum's namesake, Carmen Cervera, the fifth wife of Baron Hans Heinrich Thyssen-Bornemisza (also famous for his private art collection).

The main focus of the collection is 19th-century Spanish painters with a large collection of Andalucian artists. Entry to the museum is €10 per person.



9. Mercado Central de Atarazanas

The central market of Málaga is a wonderful place to head if you are self-catering while you're here. They have everything from locally grown fruit to freshly caught fish. Andalucia is one of the largest producers of fruit in the entire EU, so don't miss out on some fantastically fresh produce.

addition to being a great place to do some grocery shopping, Mercado Central de Atarazanas is known as one of the best places in Málaga to go for a seafood lunch.



10. Try out the local Chiringuitos

Chiringuitos are a staple of Málaga beach life. Some are little stands right on the beach with plastic tables and chairs in the sand. Others are full on restaurants with seating both inside and outside that also happen to have a little shack to make it feel more legit. All are serving up seriously good seafood. The most popular dish to try that is



Agility Club - Starting in September!

Agility is one of the fastest-growing dog sports (and most fun!) and for good reason. It's great exercise for both you and your dog, and it can build an even deeper relationship between you. Plus, it's exhilarating to watch as your dog races through tunnels, weaves around poles, and leaps over jumps!

Understand the Basics

Dog agility is a sport where you direct your dog through an obstacle course within a certain time limit. Courses typically have between 14-20 obstacles, which can include tunnels, weave poles, tire jumps and seesaws. At each trial you and your dog will race around the unique courses designed for that day. All of this is done with your dog relying solely on the cues and body language you use to direct them on course. Anybody can do agility and any breed can participate — from the smallest dog to the biggest breed!

The Benefits of Agility

Agility training uses your dog's natural instincts. Our pet dogs need look to us for their next meal, but their ancestors were not so lucky. They had to hunt for their food and became adept at finding and chasing prey in order to survive. Often the chase was difficult. Dogs would have had to chase small mammals like rabbits through the woods, over fallen logs, around rocks, up steep embankments, and through narrow passages created by dense undergrowth. The dog had to be fast and nimble to catch his next meal. Agility courses mimic the obstacles a dog in the wild might face in pursuit of dinner and stimulate the dog's natural hunting instinct. Agility provides good exercise. Some dogs require lots of exercise to burn excess energy, and running through an obstacle course is a great way to do just that. The athletic challenge keeps a dog fit, helps prevent obesity, increases endurance, and strengthens bones and joints. Plus, an agility course exercises a dog's mind, giving him opportunities to learn and solve problems. Agility training will also help you keep in

Agility training will also help you keep in shape! You will not actually run through a tunnel or around weave poles, but you

will keep moving alongside your dog. Plus, you will stay focused on your dog's progress, making split-second decisions to help him clock the best time possible while staying on course, so you get a little mental stimulation, too. Basically, agility training provides good cardiovascular, muscular, and mental exercise for you and your dog.

Agility training bonds dog and owner. Dogs are smart creatures, but it would be difficult for them to successfully complete an agility course without the aid of their owner or handler. The human member of the team guides the dog using verbal cues and hand signals, so good communication between canine and human is essential. This level of communication, and the time spent training, bond a dog and owner in a very special way. As the dog relies on its owner for guidance on the course, they will also become more obedient and well-behaved off the course. Before you get started in agility, it helps to have the basics of training mastered such as sit, stay, wait and good recall. This will make it much

easier for you to direct your dog through the course. If you'd like to find out more about how to get started in agility, or to join classes at Dog School Nerja, then get in touch either on social media or drop me an email. There are agility regular classes over the summer in Nerja, or if you need to start from scratch, then you can start off with a Beginners Class in basic obedience. 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The multi-manager investment approach – specialists vs generalists

Multi-manager investment enables your portfolio to be managed by several different fund managers, each selected for their expertise in specific market sectors. Decathletes have to be skilled at 10 different disciplines – speed for sprinting, stamina for distance, strength for the field events etc. But while the decathlon champion performs at extremely high standards across ten disciplines, the individual event specialists frequently achieve better results.

Let's compare the performance of the decathlon gold medallist at the 2020 Tokyo Olympics against the gold medallists in the individual disciplines. The decathlon champion Damian Warner ran the 100m in 10.12 seconds. Lamont Marcell Jacobs took just 9.80 seconds in the

individual event. Warner threw the javelin 63.44m; the individual event winner threw 87.58m. The results of the other eight disciplines tell the same story – the specialist performed better than the generalist every time.

You would not expect a sprinter to also specialise in javelin or pole vault; specialists tend to be just that – specialists. There are many situations in life where a specialist performs more efficiently and delivers better results than a generalist, and this is particularly true in investments.

Just because an investment manager is skilled at managing UK equities, for example, does not mean they will be as successful at managing US or Japanese equities. Managers also tend to specialise in a certain style of investing, and these styles move in and out of favour according to economic and other factors. They will therefore produce impressive results in certain conditions, but below average ones in others.

Some investors rely on just one or two fund managers to look after their investment capital. But wouldn't you prefer to have individual specialists managing the various areas of the market your capital is invested in?

Multi-manager investing

Today most investors agree that holding different asset classes and different regions and sectors in their portfolio spreads risk. Multi-manager funds add a further, increasingly important, level of diversification to your portfolio.

You will benefit from a team of specialist managers, as well as diversification across multiple investment styles

Multi-manager investing is not designed to attempt to win a gold medal in just one particular season. Rather, it aims to produce consistent results, season by season, over a long-term period.

This investment approach can prove suitable for various investors with different needs. Caper Mayonnaise

4 tsp (20 ml) lemon juice

4 tsp capers, chopped

1 small clove garlic, finely chopped

Salmon Patties:-

1 ½ lb (675 g) skinless salmon, finely chopped

2 green onions, finely chopped

1/3 cup (40 g) breadcrumbs

1 egg, lightly beaten

2 tbsp chopped parsley

2 tbsp (30 ml) mayonnaise

2 tsp (10 ml) lemon juice

1 tsp dry mustard

Burgers:-

6 hamburger buns

6 leaves lettuce

1 English cucumber, thinly sliced lengthwise

In a small bowl, combine all the ingredients. Keep in the refrigerator until ready to serve.

Salmon Patties

In another bowl, combine all the ingredients until smooth. Add bread crumbs if the mixture is too soft. Season with salt and pepper. Shape into 6 patties.

Adjust the burners to medium heat. Grill the patties for 3 to 4 minutes on each side or until the salmon is cooked through. Toast the buns. Spread the caper mayonnaise on the inside of the toasted buns. Place the lettuce and then the patties on the bottom halves of the buns. Garnish with cucumber slices and cover with the top halves of the buns.



Pink Lemonade Jelly Slice

Pink lemonade jelly slice

Serves:- 12

Ingredients:-

250g butternut snap biscuits crushed 100g butter melted

Filling:-

2 tsp gelatine powder
1 ½ tbs water
375 g cream cheese softened
1 cup condensed milk
2 tbs lemon juice

Jelly:-

3 tsp gelatine powder

2 tbs water

2 ½ cups lemonade room temperature

1 tbs lemon juice

1 splash pink food colouring

Preparation:-

Line a 20cm square cake pan with plastic wrap. Combine crushed biscuits and melted butter in a bowl. Stir to combine. Press over base of pan. Refrigerate for 30 minutes or until firm.

Filling: Sprinkle gelatine over water in a heatproof cup. Stand cup in a pan of simmering water, until dissolved and then cool slightly. Using electric beaters, beat cream cheese until smooth. Beat in condensed milk, lemon juice and then gelatine mixture. Spread mixture into pan and smooth the surface. Refrigerate for 3 hours or until just set. Jelly: Sprinkle gelatine over water in a heatproof cup. Stand cup in a pan of simmering water, until dissolved. Combine lemonade and lemon juice in a bowl. Tint with food colour. Whisk in gelatine mixture until combined. Pour jelly over filling. Refrigerate for 3 hours or until set. Serve slice cut into squares.

Whisk all the ingredients together, except for the chicken wings in a jug.


Place chicken wings into a large freezer bag, then pour in marinade.

Bake chicken at 200C in a baking dish, turning, for approximately 30 minutes or until chicken is cooked and sauce is brown and sticky.



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THE PYRAMIDAL SYNDROME AND ITS TREATMENT



Piriformis syndrome, although less well known than other musculoskeletal conditions, can be a significant source of low back and sciatic pain. 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"Tobacco, tobacco. Sing sweetly for tobacco. Tobacco is like love"

Those words, from a 16th century song, kept repeating in my head recently as I conducted medical revisions on Spanish construction workers. Considering the historical connection Spain has with tobacco - after all, it brought tobacco to Europe 500 years ago and the first cigarette factory was opened in Sevilla in 1620

1620. I should not have been surprised that 70% of my construction worker patients smoked. Still, no matter how deeply ingrained tobacco is in Spanish history, culture and habits, it was my responsibility to challenge their smoking addiction. So, what can I tell a smoker that can help them quit? With giant black letters marking each pack of cigarettes with phrases like "Smoking Kills", they already get the point that smoking is bad for them. So, why don't they quit? Because smoking makes them feel good. Make that really, really good. Within eight seconds, after a drag off a cigarette, nicotine starts a chemical cascade of neurotransmitters-brain chemicals - that flood over the brain's pleasure centres. The brain starts working better with nicotine; improving memory, concentration, reaction time. Nicotine works to convince the brain that it is as needed for survival as food, sex and water, which explains why it is a very powerfully addictive substance. So, how can a smoker quit? While making the

decision to stop smoking



is important, don't rely on willpower alone. There are several evidencebased options out there to make quitting a lot easier. Nicotine replacements, such as gums, lozenges or patches, work well for many people and are safe. It is the burnt carcinogens in tobacco that are harmful not the nicotine. Using two different types of nicotine replacements, like a patch and the gum, at the same time can work better for some people than using only one. There are new pharmacological treatments like bupropion, which changes the way your body responds

to nicotine, and varenicline, which bonds to the nicotine receptors in your brain thus reducing your cravings for a cigarette.

Combining some good behaviour therapy to help unlearn the habits and rituals that go along with smoking will increase chances for success.

Counselling really helps to cope without nicotine and to learn to recognise the cues that provoke that cigarette urge. While current smoking restrictions protect non smokers from second hand smoke, these restriction have turned smokers into a new type of "social"

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pariah". My construction worker patients told me that they started smoking when they were teenagers. They could not have possibly known that their brains would get rewired in a way that would make them lifetime slaves to the habit. These patients need sympathy and understanding that smoking is something extremely hard to give up. Fortunately, there are these new treatments and medications to give them the support they need.

If you want to stop smoking, work with your physician to come up with a tailor made plan for you.





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

If you are physically fit and can make a regular commitment of even a couple of hours a week we would love to hear from you ...please consider being a volunteer at Jubilee House. You don't need immediate interaction with people you can just come and "sit in the garden" (we only ask that you have a Police Check as we care for the vulnerable – it's only €4). If you are artistic or play games like Rumikup or are happy just making conversation or reading to a guest you would be very welcome.

If you can't come to us and NEED us to provide support in your own home providing you with an experienced carer from 1.5 hours a day to a live in care 24 /7. Our carer / companions can take you out shopping or for a meal or bring the outside world to you and collect your groceries, clean the house, make meals and assist with your personal hygiene within a budget that is acceptable to you.

Nursing support is also provided to suggest coping strategies and liaise with the GP.

Let's chase loneliness away!

ocal to Málaga is the espetos. Espetos are locally caught sardines that are skewered on what looks like a sword and then cooked over an open fire pit until perfectly grilled. Crispy and salty on the outside, meaty and delicious on the inside. Add a squeeze of lemon and enjoy it with some bread. Most chiringuitos have tons of grilled seafood options that they'll cook over the same open fire (it usually looks like it's an old boat full of sand).



11. Exploring the Soho Neighbourhood

Soho has recently become the new cool neighbourhood in town. If you're looking for craft beer, craft cocktails, boutique hotels, and new-wave coffee shops, this is the neighbourhood where you'll find them all.

That being said, the neighbourhood is really all about supporting local businesses. This is where you will find the locally owned bars, the small artist-owned galleries, and other artisan shops that support local creatives.

The neighbourhood revitalization started with locals. You will notice on your walk around the neighbourhood the huge murals that cover many of the buildings here. Projects to support the neighbourhood are now also being funded by the local government.



12. Visit the Beaches

The beaches in Malaga are some of the best in Spain. There are several really great beaches within a short walk or bus journey from the centre of Málaga. Playa La Malagueta is the downtown beach. This makes it the busiest. But it is also easy to get to and very long, so there's plenty of space to grab some sand for your towel and the water is lovely for swimming. La Malagueta also has volleyball courts, a small outdoor gym, and a playground for kids.

If you want to get further afield to somewhere a little bit quieter, my personal favourite Málaga beach is Playa Pedregalejo. It's much smaller and can fill up quickly on weekends, but if you are visiting during the week you can

have it almost to yourself. Other beaches worth visiting that are easy to reach are Playas del Palo and Playa de los Álamos.



13. Sunset Boat Trip around the Bay

A boat tour around Malaga is a very affordable thing to do. For as little as €12 you can head out on a catamaran around the bay. For a few more euros you can add snorkelling to the itinerary. They offer them at midday and at sunset. Fly Blue is the main provider of these trips around the bay.



14. The Caminito del Rey walk

While this isn't exactly one of the top things to do in Málaga, it is one of the best things to do while you are visiting Málaga. If you rent a car, it's very easy to visit on your own. However, if you don't have a car, you'll need to visit the canyon with a tour. I highly recommend this tour which costs €60 per person.

It picks you up and drops you back off in Málaga and includes your entry ticket, a bilingual guide, and all transportation. The Caminito del Rey was once known as one of the most dangerous hikes in the world.

After several deaths in the park, the government shut it down and put into place a plan to revamp the trail and make it safe for all visitors. Now you have to pre-book your tickets online and only a certain number of visitors are allowed per day.

You have to wear a hard hat and the trail itself is completely new and although it feels gravity-defying in some places, is incredibly safe to walk. As you hike along the trail, you can actually see some of the old trails. If you aren't too afraid of heights, this is actually a very flat and relatively easy walk to do. You don't need to be particularly fit to hike it.





"My father drank very heavily, there was rage and a lot of criticism in my childhood, (still is actually), and I was made to feel like nothing was ever good enough.

I started drinking in my early teens, and it was superb! It made me feel like a grown up. My drinking was a problem from the very start. I was taken home by the police at 14 years old, by the age of 25, I had been assaulted, and it was 100% the fault of alcohol.

I chose friends who allowed me to drink the way I wanted, questioned my drinking (the amount, the frequency), or pointed out the damage it was doing to me, would have been ejected from my circle very quickly, no-one dared to confront me on it.

The assault led me to seek out Alcoholics Anonymous for the first time. I knew it existed as a grandparent had told me of another family member who had got sober, and how proud of them they were.

I spent 18 years in AA where I would gain a period of sobriety, and then follow it with a relapse. Each relapse it got worse. I believe that some of the reason for this, was I had given up alcohol but had tried to use other substances, such as marijuana, 'to protect my sobriety.'

The last relapse was horrific

The last relapse was horrific because my children saw me drunk and out of control, I felt like I

was a monster in their eyes.

Since then, I have committed to 3 AA meetings per week, I speak regularly with my sponsor, I work the 12-step program, as it has been suggested to me, instead of me trying to do it my way, and as a result I have changed the way I think

I sometimes wish I had 'got it' the first time, but that was not my journey and there is a reason for that.

My life now is more manageable. My ego is under control, in its box. I needed to change the way I thought, to enable me to be happy. I stopped drinking and smoking; and as a result of working the 12-steps, I have sobriety and happiness"

There are meetings of Alcoholics Anonymous, with friendly people who will understand, held daily, throughout the Costa del Sol. Meetings are free to attend, and anyone who thinks they may have a problem with alcohol is welcome.

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
